Format: Typed, double spaced. Margins: 1" on all sides. Font Size -- 14 pt. Font : Times New Roman.

- 1. Make a shoe box film strip.
- 2. Make a timeline picture of all the major events of one of the books.
- 3. Design a mobile using six different characters, events or both to illustrate the mobile.
- 4. Make a book Jacket.
- 5. Build a miniature stage setting of a scene from one of the books.

All projects must be neat and colorful.

Students may complete any of the following activities for their required reading assignment. Written reports should be 200 words long for 5th grade unless otherwise stated. Spelling and grammar will be graded.

1. Research and write a report on the author.

2. Make up your own test, using multiple choice, short answer, true/false, and essay questions. The test must have at least 25 questions.

3. Compare and contrast the book with another you have read.

4. If you were forced to give your pet away, which character in the story would you give it to and why?

5. Write an alternative ending for your story.

6. Imagine that you are a character in the book. Write a diary for a few days or weeks pretending you are that character.

7. Transform your book into a puppet show. Make finger puppets or stick puppets and write a presentation of the story or a scene from it.

Book Project and Requirements

Making a new book jacket for the book.

- Front cover: Draw and color an illustration for the book.
- Inside front flap: Write descriptions of the main characters.
- Inside back flap: Write a description of the setting and a short summary of the book.
- Back cover: Write 5-10 quotes from the book that are important to understand the story.
